Pebruary 2nd is an intriguing day in the calendar, as it marks two seemingly unrelated events: Candlemas and Groundhog Day. However, a closer look at their history and symbolism reveals surprising connections between these traditions, blending ancient customs with Christian liturgy and folklore.

Candlemas is a Christian holiday that commemorates the Presentation of Jesus at the Temple, as described in the Gospel of Luke. It falls exactly 40 days after Christmas and is traditionally cele-

brated with the blessing of candles, symbolizing Jesus as the "light of the world." The name "Candlemas" itself derives from this tradition of lighting and blessing candles. We will be celebrating the first Sunday in February.

Historically, Candlemas also signified a turning point in the agricultural calendar. In medieval Europe, it was a day to mark the midpoint of winter and to begin looking forward to the renewal of spring. This seasonal shift was often observed in tandem with weather predictions, which is where the connection to Groundhog Day begins to emerge. Groundhog Day, a North American tradition, centers on a groundhog predicting the weather: if the groundhog sees its shadow, there will be six more weeks of winter; if not, spring will arrive early. This seemingly quirky ritual has its roots in ancient European weather lore. Germans, in particular, celebrated a day called "Sieben-Schläfer-Tag" (Seven Sleepers' Day) or other seasonal markers, which often involved animals—like badgers or hedgehogs—as indicators of weather patterns.

When German immigrants settled in Pennsylvania, they adapted the tradition to the local fauna, replacing the European hedgehog with the native groundhog. The result was Groundhog Day, which retained the weather-forecasting motif but in a uniquely American form.

The connection between Candlemas and Groundhog Day lies in their shared focus on the changing seasons. Both traditions stem from ancient agricultural societies that paid close attention to the natural world, relying on celestial events and animal behavior to guide their work.

An old English rhyme about Candlemas reflects this weather-watching tradition: If Candlemas be fair and bright, Winter will have another flight. If Candlemas brings cloud and rain, Winter will not come again.

This sentiment mirrors the folklore of Groundhog Day, emphasizing the day's role as a hinge between winter and spring. Both celebrations carry echoes of humanity's age-old desire to understand and predict the natural cycles that govern life.

While Candlemas holds deep religious significance, and Groundhog Day is largely secular, their shared focus on light, renewal, and the passage of seasons highlights the human need to find meaning and rhythm in time. Candlemas' emphasis on light as a symbol of hope and Groundhog Day's playful weather predictions both speak to our enduring relationship with nature and the seasons.

In celebrating these traditions, whether by lighting candles or watching a groundhog emerge from its burrow, we participate in a cultural legacy that bridges faith, folklore, and the natural world. February 2nd, therefore, stands as a reminder of the ways in which ancient and modern practices can intertwine, offering continuity and connection across time.

Applying Bible Principles to Stewardship

"You will have all you want to eat, and you will give thanks to the Lord your God for the fertile land that he has given you. . . Remember that it is the Lord your God who gives you the power to become rich. . ." (Deut.8:10, 18).

The Bible repeatedly says that we are to "praise the Lord," or as some translations read, we are to "bless the Lord." But what does that mean? Whatever else it might mean, it entails having a thankful heart for all that God has done for us. It's easy, you know, to go to an extreme and to emphasize only God's spiritual blessings to the exclusion of His temporal blessings. It's also easy to emphasize only His material blessings and to forget His provisions for us spiritually. In reality, we are to emphasize both the material and spiritual blessings we receive from God, remembering that all that we have comes from His bountiful hand.

As we realize God's provisions for us, day after day, week after week, month after month, and year after year, we literally "praise the Lord" by a lifestyle that is marked by thanksgiving for all that God has done for us. And that spirit of gratitude for past, present and future blessings causes us to want to give to the Lord from the bounty He has provided for us. As one unknown author wrote, "Thanksgiving, to be truly Thanksgiving, is first thanks, then giving."

Think about it: As we receive God's blessings, we offer praise and thanksgiving to Him. And as we realize afresh that all that we have is a result of God's goodness, our response to His faithfulness is to give back to God a portion of that which was already His. We do so, not because we have to or out of any sense of obligation or guilt. We give to the Lord because we want to do so, in response to His great love for us and in response to His goodness.

Dwight L. Moody was once reading Psalm 103. When he came to the verse which describes how we are to praise the Lord and to remember His benefits, Mr. Moody stopped short in his inimitable way and exclaimed, "You can't remember them all, of course, but don't forget them all. Remember some of them!" And as you "remember some of them," remember the sequence: First thanks, then giving.


This snack's layers mimic properties of our planet's crust.

What you need:


- 1 cup rolled oats
- ½ cup nut butter (divided)
- ½ cup chocolate chips
- Microwave-safe bowl
- · Silicone mini baking cups

What you do:

- Combine the oats and ½ cup of the nut butter. Mix until oats stick together.
- Place 2 teaspoons of oat mixture in each baking cup. Press with a spoon. Freeze for 10 minutes.
- Spread remaining nut butter atop the cups. Freeze for 10 more minutes.
- Microwave the chocolate chips 30 seconds. Stir and keep heating for 30-second intervals until melted.
- Spread melted chocolate atop the cups. Freeze until chocolate is firm.
- Remove from the molds and enjoy! Refrigerate leftovers in an airtight container.

Again, if you "don't know how", ask any of the ladies and they will be happy to show you how.


Plan to join us for fun and fellowship after worship in the Fellowship Hall.


SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA FIRE VICTIMS
